
Unto the populace of Atlantia, greetings from Alisoun MacCoul of Elphane, Golden Dolphin Herald!

Herein you will find the results of the deliberations of the College of Heralds of Atlantia during the month of August, 2007.


ACCEPTANCES

The following submissions have been accepted and included on a Letter of Intent to the College of Arms from Atlantia dated 28 August, 2007:


Antonio di Capizzi. Device. Per chevron wavy Or and azure, a demi-sun and a sealion erect guardant counterchanged. This was pended for redrawing by Golden Dolphin in July, 2007.




Kingdom of Atlantia. Badge for the Award of the Vexillum Atlantiae. Per pale argent and azure, a fess wavy cotised counterchanged, overall two swords in saltire Or.




Avelyn of Kennington. Change of device. Vert, a fox's mask between three crescents argent. Golden Dolphin staff redrew the emblazon to make the fox's mask more identifiable and the crescents more in line with current standards than they were in the original submission.



Bjorn inn hávi. Name and device. Per pale sable and Or, two wyverns combatant and on a chief three roundels, all counterchanged. Golden Dolphin staff redrew the emblazon to make the wyverns more identifiable than they were in the original submission.




Eadric the Potter. Name and device. Per saltire argent and azure, in pale two goblets gules. This was pended by Golden Dolphin in July, 2007, for administrative issues that have now been resolved.




Giles Green. Device. Quarterly argent ermined vert and vert, in bend sinister two hummingbirds rising contourny, each maintaining with both feet a sword fesswise reversed argent. This was pended for redrawing by Golden Dolphin in July, 2007.

Meriall Hogaine. Change of name from Muirgheal inghean uí Ógaín.




Rhieinwylydd verch Einion Llanaelhaearn. Badge. Per bend indented argent and sable, a fleur-de-lys azure and a lion's head cabossed argent.


Sarah Elizabeth of Bellwood. Name. This name was pended by Golden Dolphin for consultation with the submitter in June, 2007.



Thomas of Chester. Device. Azure, a saltire and on a chief Or, three gouttes de sang.



Willa Faye Dunne. Change of device. Argent, a weeping willow tree proper within an orle vert. This was pended for redrawing by Golden Dolphin in July, 2007.




RETURNS


The following items have been returned for further work:

Halfdan bekkjarbrjótr. Device. Gyronny sable and vert, a stag's head cabossed argent. The field divided of two colors violates a longstanding precedent requiring fields consisting of more than four sections to have "good contrast". An additional stylistic problem is the fact that the eyes of the beast were voided of the field which is also a violation of current practice.

Radovan to je Mladji. Name. Unfortunately, we had to return this name for lack of documentation of the byname. The given name was adequately documented as a Slavic name from period Croatia name (though not from the "Serbian Roma" that the submitter indicated he desired). While Serbian can be documented as existing before 1400, no documentation was provided



Tsura to je Stariji. Name. Unfortunately, we had to return this name for lack of period documentation for both the given name and byname and a possible claim to non-human status in the given name. Both given name and byname were documented only from modern Romany and Slavic web sites. The given name was stated to be common among Slavic Romany in the United States with the added note "Tsura is a Romany translation of the Slavic name Zorya. . . . Zorya (or The Zorya) are common guardian goddesses in pre-Christian Slavic mythology." However, no evidence was provided for either *Tsura* or *Zorya* being used in period as a given name by humans. While Serbian can be documented as existing before 1400, no documentation was provided that "that is older" (the meaning given for the byname)




would have been an acceptable byname in period Serbia as the only documentation provided for the latter portion of the name was from modern on-line dictionaries with meanings for *to* and *je* and *stariji* in modern Serbian.

PENDS

The following item has been pended for the stated reasons:

Siobhán inghean Báethgalach. Name and device. Per fess rayonny sable and Or, three dragonflies, two and one, and a raven counterchanged. The given name and patronymic particle are both early modern Irish forms from after 1200, but *Báethgalach* is a pre-1200 nominative form. As the genitive is required after the patronymic particle and both words in the phrase must be from the same language, the name after *inghean* should be an early modern Irish genitive and, given the conventions of post-1200 names, should also be lenited. However, the changes required to make the name linguistically consistent exceed the minor changes the submitter allows. Therefore, Golden Dolphin has pended this name to consult with the submitter to see if she will allow the name to be changed to *Siobhán*



inghean Bhaothghalaigh. The device has been pended for redrawing to make the rays in the line of division fewer and bolder.
