The following items were REGISTERED by the Laurel Office:


Alester MacClansy. Name.


Catarina Caravello. Name and device. Vert, a swan and on a chief urdy argent three trilliums sable.


Elizabeta de Porta. Name.

Iseulte of the Red Cliffs. Change of device. Ermine, a unicorn rampant gules within a bordure sable. Her former device ("Per fess indented of five points sable and Or, a decrescent Or and five chevronels braced gules.") is retained as a badge.

Jacques le Fol. Name and device. Argent, on a heart purpure winged gules a death's head argent all within a bordure purpure. The Laurel staff modified the originally submitted Jacques le Fou, ruling that that Old French spelling of the byname was more appropriate for our period.








Katyn of the Black Forest. Device. Argent, a letter "Z" between three pine trees couped sable.

Luke of Bright Hills. Badge. (Fieldless) A rocket Or.

Matthew of Battle. Badge. (Fieldless) A raven sable within and conjoined to a chaplet of ivy vert.


Peregrine de Birmingeham. Name.


Rose Wynd of Cydllan Downs. Device. Or, between in pale a crescent pendant and a crescent conjoined at the horns sable, a roundel azure.



Storvik, Barony of. Association of badge with order name. The previously registered badge ("Azure, in chief a label dovetailed ermine.") has now been associated with the previously registered name of the Order of the Faering.

Ysoria Baska. Device. Gules semy of bees, issuant from sinister base a demi-sun Or.





RETURNS

The following items have been returned for further work:

Matthew of Battle. Household name for the Fellowship of the Ivy Crune. The Laurel staff returned the name, ruling that while the use of ivy and crown in inn names might be appropriate there was no evidence that the two combined would have been used in an inn name. They indicated that a form such as "House of the Ivy Garland" might be appropriate, based on period inn names, but that "showing that a name is appropriate for an inn does not mean that the name is automatically also appropriate for a fellowship". Since the submitter had indicated that the "fellowship" element was most important to him, they opted to return the name as a whole rather than register it as "House of the Ivy Garland".
